Performing/Visual Arts Electives and Auditions

Act Up: Theatre Arts provides performance-based learning in storytelling, design, collaborative processes, and performance skills. Incoming students with significant prior theatrical experiences may request an audition/interview to waive the Theatre Arts I pre-requisite. Extra-curricular opportunities include the fall play, the spring musical, stage crew and comedy improv. Contact: Pam Land

Dance On: Dance consists of composition, choreography, multiple dance forms, and performance. Dance teaches students to express themselves creatively and critically and improves energy, strength, balance, flexibility, and endurance. Dance I requires no audition. A dance workshop is available Feb. 6, 2018 from 3:30-5:30 pm; students will learn 2 dances (jazz and lyrical); auditions (groups of 4) will be held Feb. 8, 2018 from 3-6 pm. Dance participants in Jr. and Sr. Dance Companies plan travel to Disney World to perform in Disney Springs. Contact: Jennifer Hennesie

Be Visual: Even with a little interest in Art or Photo, you might be considering how to express yourself and build a portfolio. Art I is a pre-requisite for Art II or Photo I. Physical Education

/Health Requirements

Lifetime Fitness (Semester) helps students develop physical literacy through health and skill-related concepts of fitness while engaging in lifelong physical activities.

Health Education (Semester) helps students develop an understanding of health concepts, behaviors, and skills that reduce health risks and enhance the health and well-being of self and others.

Regular physical activity is one of the most important things adolescents can do for good health. It helps to reduce stress and anxiety as well as increases self-esteem. It may also help improve a student's academic performance.

PE Electives offer even more opportunities for physical activity.

Technology Ed for Graduation

Foundations of Technology: In this course, students explore different types of technology, create/code websites, enhance computer skills and improve presentation skills. Students create designs using both sketching and Computer Aided Design techniques. Students also work in teams using hand tools and power tools to build structures, devices, and circuits. Exploring Computer Science: In this course students experience real-world relevant computing problems while gaining foundation computer science knowledge. Contact: Kevin Cannon

Computer Science AP: In this course, students engage in a fast-paced course that extends the study of fundamental principles and technology of object-oriented programming. All grade levels are eligible and it is one of the few Advanced Placement courses available to 9th graders. This also prepares students for the Computer Science Academy. Contact: Vicki Mariano

AP in 9th Grade... Human Geography AP

Students learn about patterns and processes that have shaped social and environmental outcomes. 9th Graders are able to enroll in the Advanced Placement course, especially if they have a strong interest in social studies. Contact: Callie Casper

Electives and More...

The HCPSS Catalog of Approved High School Courses for the 2018-2019 school year provides a wealth of information about academies and elective courses. Courses at RHHS support the **Teacher Academy** and **Project Lead the Way**. Students also can access courses in the **Accounting, Finance, and Marketing Academies**. Many students attend the ARL as part of their daily schedules. Also, JumpStart programs of study at RHHS include early college programming in general studies, computer science, criminal justice, and entrepreneurship.
